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### A NEW BISHOP

When does a new bishop actually, in law, take charge of his diocese i.e. assume its spiritual jurisdiction? If already in episcopal orders, at what point does he relinquish his old bishopric and take on the new? Not, for sure, at his enthronement, the ceremony which attracts most of the press coverage - by then he has been at his new post for several weeks. No, following his ELECTION - a formality - by the Dean and Chapter of his cathedral, the big moment comes with the CONFIRMATION of his election.

Monday, January 17th, 2011: a big City Church, a few minutes from St. Paul's, St. Mary-le-Bow. Dating from late mediaeval times, it has been the normal venue for confirming bishops in the Province of Canterbury for centuries. The Church was badly damaged by enemy action during the last War but has been splendidly restored. I had attended the confirmation of Bp. Tom Butler some 15 years ago, then held in Lambeth Palace crypt and chapel; I recall perhaps a dozen members of the public attending - this time a full church - maybe 100 to 150 to witness the proceedings (how they all found out the date, time and venue I don't know - I had the greatest difficulty. It is all arranged by a body called The Registry - based in Oxford!)

Basically the ceremony is both religious and legal, in a ratio of about 1:2. After a brief declaration of Christopher Chessun's election, a long procession enters from a side chapel, headed by the Verger and tailed by the Archbishop of Canterbury. Their lordships of York and London also take part, like Canterbury in rochets and red chimeres. The legal luminaries, in barristers' wigs and gowns, are the Proctor, Advocate, Provincial Registrar and Vicar General (all, presumably, devout churchmen), the last leading the legal proceedings in this Court of Arches. First, however, the Archbishop interrogates the Bishop-elect, leading to a short but eloquent address as to what should be his priorities.

The Church is brilliantly lit but chilly - Rector apologises - boiler's packed up. Finally, after a hymn, the dignitaries file out in the same order as before. We have a new Bishop. Finding him in a tête-à-tête with Croydon and Kingston I voiced the hope that one of them would be re-dedicating All Saints when the "re-ordering" is finished - they seemed to know about it;
