

Jessie observed: 'The parents at the brick kilns seem content just to have a job, but they have little access to healthcare and are unable to provide for their children's welfare - both their physical and mental well-being.

'CSI wants to help these families where they are and create a better future for the children. It is hoped that education and health awareness will prove empowering for the next generation.'

CSI's outreach programme will be run from a satellite-clinic of the Dr Anne Booth Mission Hospital. The programme will include schooling, healthcare, the provision of fresh vegetables and instruction in nutrition, and AIDS awareness training.

Brick making is an expanding industry. There are more than 2,000 brick kilns in Tamil Nadu due to the quality of the clay and the intense heat, which is necessary for baking bricks in the open air. Labourers work for nine months of the year - avoiding the monsoon season - working up to 16 hours a day. They prepare wet clay bricks during the night and early morning, when it is cool, and then leave the bricks to bake in the sun.

Brick labourers are poorly paid, so many are forced to borrow money from their employers. Finding themselves deeply in debt, they become 'bonded' to their employers - bringing accusations that brick labouring is a modern day form of slavery.

Most of the migrant workers in Veerachi Mangalam are Hindus, from a number of Dalit sub-castes, but their needs are so severe they are happy to put aside caste and religious differences and receive help from the Christian community.

'This is not an exercise in proselytising,' explained Jessie. 'The hospital and church leaders who visited the brick kiln were moved by Christ's compassion for the poor. Our aim is to work sensitively alongside the labourers and give hope to the marginalised.'

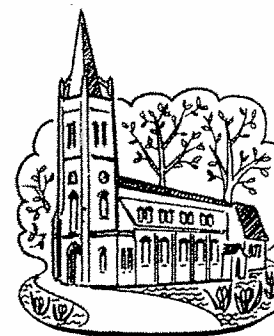

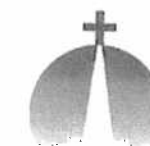
Saints of the Month: April.

- 23rd St George. Patron of England, Greece and Catalonia, also of soldiers and boy scouts.
